St. Patrick

People generally associate St. Patrick's Day with Ireland leprechauns, beer, and lots of green. But the true story is even more meaningful. Who was Patrick? He was born in 385AD in Roman Britannia, today known as Dumbarton, Scotland. He wrote in his autobiography:



My name is Patrick. I am a sinner, a simple country person, and the least of all believers. I am looked down upon by many. My father was Calpornius. He was a deacon; his father was Potitus, a priest, who lived at Bannavem Taburniae. His home was near there, and that is where I was taken prisoner. I was about sixteen at the time. Six years passed and Patrick had a vivid dream which showed him an escape route. Emboldened, Patrick escaped and walked over 200 miles to the shoreline. As he approached the docks, a British ship stood waiting. The sails unfurled and Patrick was home. But he didn't stay long.

Before he was a prisoner, his faith meant little to him. That changed during his captivity. His previously weak faith was strengthened during his slavery, and he committed to his faith in earnest. He became a priest and soon felt burdened for the people who had kidnapped him. So he returned to Ireland with a mission.

Patrick wanted pagan Ireland to convert to Christ. This did not set well with Loegaire, the pagan king of Ireland. People threatened Patrick's life, so he started carrying a dagger. Yet, he did not give up. Eventually the king converted and Patrick baptized him, and much of Ireland followed. A later legend said that Patrick rid Ireland of snakes, but this probably references Patrick ridding Ireland of pirates and barbarianism by bringing a whole new Christian ethic. A New York Times' bestselling book's premise is that St. Patrick saved civilization in Ireland. Patrick would come to be known as the "Apostle of Ireland." He planted churches as he crisscrossed Ireland. Curiously, like most of his legend, St. Patrick is not even a Catholic saint. Patrick wrote that he was a sinner, not a saint.

Legend has it that Patrick died on March 17, 461. So should believers celebrate St. Patrick's Day? If you do, you might want to consider wearing orange. Why orange? After 1798 the color of green represented Roman Catholicism and orange symbolized Protestantism—after William of Orange, the Protestant king. The holiday is certainly not to be celebrated by partying and alcoholism. But wearing orange and sharing who St. Patrick really would be an excellent way to celebrate.

So we best remember Patrick not via legends and certainly not in our culture's celebrations. Another way to remember him is by "St. Patrick's Breastplate", or a prayer for protection: Christ with me, Christ before me, Christ behind me, Christ in me, Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ on my right, Christ on my left, Christ when I lie down, Christ when I sit down, Christ when I arise, Christ in the heart of every man who thinks of me, Christ in the mouth of everyone who speaks of me, Christ in every eye that sees me, Christ in every ear that hears me.
