"Trials Kind of Guy"

I'm a trials kind of guy. I like, in incremental and small doses, trials, that push me out of my comfort zone. Do note, the "incremental and small doses" part! In fact, I was listening to a sermon the night before Brother Ted gave his New Year's sermon on James 1:1-4 on the joys of trials, so I definitely see this as a sign that I should write about Trials.

Don't get me wrong, I do fear being pushed out of my comfort zone. And I do dislike having dreams, hopes and desires shut down. I dislike even further that an important rate limiting step of a well-thought out plan gets put out of commission so that all my plans goes to naught! And I do dislike that like any trial, more creative thought, more work and more exhausting work has to be invested.

"So what, Cliff, is it that you like," you ask?

I like how God, through trials, speaks to me. He reminds me that it's not about my plans, but about His plans. Jeremiah 29:11—For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope. He constantly reminds me, that He knows what's best. He is teaching me to work with Him, for Him, and not for me. So when a trial comes along, He is telling me, "Nah Cliff, not that..." It's during this humbling (if I can shake off the pride thing), that I can see clearer what God wants me to do.

You may think that some things we do may not even be for Him, like at work, or working in the yard. During these types of trials, I have found that He is working on my character. Am I being patient enough? Am I being kind, gracious, and understanding? Am I using the intellectual, physical and emotional gifts He has given me to work through trials in the best way possible? Am I being God's light? You can really measure a person's character not when things are going great but when things are going bad. Is the person I am working with seeing a glimpse of God through me?

Finally, trials that God has graced us with will inevitably cause stress. We need to understand that stress can be used to propel us pass the trial, but unfortunately, if not controlled, can tear us and wear us down. We do have an option to try and control our response to the stress. Stress out of control can cause headaches, high blood pressure, heart attacks, body aches and negative and addictive behaviors. There are many techniques to regulate our stress response, but the point is, we all need to realize that stress, when not dealt with properly can get in the way of getting us through the trial. 1 Peter 5:7 "Casting all your anxieties on him, because he cares for you." It does help me quite a bit, knowing that throughout the trials I have met, Jesus Christ is with me, and my anxieties and stress can be cast on Him. In fact, isn't this where we need to turn to God the most, when trials and stress are at their greatest? He is here for us, He always is.
