#### Different Points of View

These two pictures are of the same flower, although taken a day apart. They remind me of how different things can be when I change my perspective.





In the Bible there is a famous story of two different perspectives. You probably recall the story, where Joseph was sold as a slave, packed off to Egypt and, through God's graciousness, rose to become a powerful government official.

Reading Genesis 50, I found it interesting to think how one's point of view results in very different perceptions of the same event. In the story, Jacob, Joseph's father, dies. So, because their father is no longer alive, Joseph's brothers are afraid that Joseph will avenge the wrong they had brought on Joseph when they sold Joseph as a slave and had him shipped off to a foreign land. So fearfully, that they ask Joseph for mercy; even offering themselves as slaves to Joseph. I think it's amazing, that Joseph sees the past decisions of his brothers, as God working through evil and bad behavior to do good by saving the entire family from starvation (v. 20). Two different reactions to a very difficult period in Joseph's life.

It's hard to see things from different points of view, especially when you're in the middle of difficult events. This story is a reminder that God knows our disappointments and that He wants us to know that He wants the best outcome for us. As a young man, Joseph was faced with a dismal outlook, but he came to know that God had a great plan for his life and to live with a gracious attitude towards those whom he could have kept a deep anger.

I've had ups and downs in my life. One of my disappointments was not getting a job interview that I thought would have been a perfect job situation and one for which I easily qualified. Even though I thought it would be a great

employment opportunity, I know now that God had other plans for me—an even better job and career. And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose—Romans 8:28, ESV.

God knows our disappointments, but from His point of view, He wants the best for us, including not just our jobs, but also the best for us in understanding His values and trusting that He is leading us with love.
