What happened during the 400 year intermission between the Old and New Testaments?

- The Old Testament writings, including the Psalms, were collected and canonized.
- The writings of the prophets were collected, canonized and studied.
- Israel's hopeless obsession with idols was replaced a hard-nosed adherence to monotheism.
- Judaism officially became Israel's national religion.
- In addition to the temple, synagogues were built all over the Mediterranean world wherever there was a population of Jews, for the purpose of learning God's Word and for worship.
- There was a rise of new religious leaders: Scribes, Pharisees, Sadducees

"In short, exile represents the death of Israel. In losing her land, Israel apparently also loses her identity, history, and covenant relationship with Yahweh. Restoration from exile, then, is a resurrection from death to life." —Dr. Kenneth J. Turner, "The Death of Death in the Death of Israel"

Deuteronomy 30:1-6

SOME QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION AND DEVOTION:

- 1. When you visit a new shopping mall and wish to find a particular store, it's common for to look for the kiosk showing the floorplan of the mall. Once you find the kiosk, you look up the store and then what? The big red dot that says, "You are here." Think of an example of where you are today in relation to the place you want to be.
- 2. Now using the story of Israel as a spiritual road map, what part of Israel's journey can you relate with? 1. Are you walking in faith (like Abraham) in obedience to God's promise? 2. Do you feel in bondage and crying to God for deliverance? 3. Do you sense that God has "opened up the sea" after being trapped for a long time? 3. Do you feel as if you're walking aimlessly in the wilderness? 4. Are you trying to occupy the land God had promised with mixed results? 5. Do you feel you're in exile? 6. Do you find yourself on the other side of exile? What part of Israel's journey do you most identify and why?
- 3. For Israel, the exile needed to be part of her spiritual journey so that her heart would be humbled to follow the Lord. What areas have you suffered loss and found yourself turning to God as a result of it?
